President's message

Can Silicon Valley be conservative, again?

I was born in San Jose, as was my
father, and have seen many changes.
This is one of the questions I like to
ask naysayers who grumble about how
liberal the valley is: "Which candidate
did the San Jose Mercury News
endorse for president in 1964?"

In 1964, the United States was
embroiled in the Vietnam War.
President Lyndon Johnson, who had
assumed office upon the assassination
of John Kennedy, dictated every move
the American military was allowed
to take from the White House. In
other words, the war in Vietnam was
being fought just the way Obama was
fighting ISIS, by tying the hands of the
military.

Barry Goldwater, the five-term
senator from Arizona, was the
Republican nominee. Thanks to
rumors that Goldwater would drop
an atomic bomb on Vietnam, he lost
to Johnson in a landslide. Despite
his loss, Goldwater is credited
with sparking the resurgence of the
American conservative political
movement in the 1960s.

The Mercury and News (they were
separate papers at the time) endorsed
Barry Goldwater over Lyndon Johnson
in 1964.

We have to go back about 70 years
before 1964 to understand why Santa
Clara County was very conservative
for the first part of the 20th century.

The last few years before the turn of
the 20th century saw much corruption
in politics in Santa Clara County.
The culprit was the Republican Party
controlled by the Southern Pacific

political bureau and led by John D.
McKenzie and political bosses that
operated out of the California Club
and supported by the San Jose Evening
News.

To stand against this corruption, a
splinter group of Republicans created
the Good Government League. Led
by the two Hayes brothers (Everis
Anson and Jay Orly), they pledged
to support "pure, honest and fearless
men." Understanding that the local
newspapers were mouthpieces for
corrupt politicians, the Hayes brothers
purchased the San Jose Herald in 1900
and the Mercury in 1901. They also
purchased the San Jose News in 1942.

There is much more to this
fascinating story that I have no room
to cover here. More details can be
found in "The Gem of Edenvale—
The Historic Hayes Mansion of San
Jose, California" (published in 1994).
Everis Anson Hayes went on to serve
in Congress and his brother, Jay
Orly Hayes, was the publisher of the
Mercury News and ran unsuccessfully
for governor of California in 1918,
100 years ago.

Mary Hayes Chenoweth and her
sons, J.O and Everis, had the funds to
purchase the newspapers and change
the atmosphere in Santa Clara County
because they discovered and mined
iron ore in Wisconsin. Iron ore was a
necessary component in the production
of steel.

Let's pray that someone who
supports "pure, honest and fearless
men (and women!)" will again arise in
Silicon Valley to purchase the liberal
media.

Prevent voter fraud by working election day

The Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters is hiring election officers to help on election day, June 5. These positions pay for both training and for hours worked on election day, \$145 for clerks and students and \$200 for precinct inspectors.

Even high school students are encouraged to apply.

Here are some details about being an election worker:

Before June 5, election officers:

- Attend a training class
- Conduct partial setup the day before the election

On election day, before polls open:

- Arrive at the assigned polling site by 6 a.m.

- Complete opening procedures and help setup polling site, ensuring it opens for voting by 7 a.m.

On election day during voting:

- Follow procedures to establish a voter’s right to vote
- Work with a team of other officers to assist and process voters
- Demonstrate how to mark ballots

After the polls close:

- Assist any voters remaining in line to vote after the polls close at 8 p.m.
- Complete closing procedures and pack up voting supplies and equipment

Qualifications: Election workers must be at least 18 years old and be U.S. citizens and California registered voters, or U.S. legal permanent residents.

High School poll workers must be at least 16 years old, enrolled in high school, have a GPA of 2.5 or better and be U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents.

The Registrar of Voters also needs poll workers who speak a second language: Chinese, Hindi, Japanese, Khmer, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog and Vietnamese.

Candidate Travis Allen fires up SVARW members

A large and enthusiastic crowd greeted gubernatorial candidate Travis Allen at SVARW’s January meeting in San Jose. A Republican assemblyman from Huntington Beach, Allen told the sell-out audience at Three Flames about what he will do if elected California governor in November 2018: focus on bringing down taxes, fixing the state’s roads, improving education and directing construction of water storage facilities.

He challenged the idea that California needs a full-time legislature.

“I don’t believe that legislators should be full-time. These guys have

to constantly justify their existence. They have to write more and more laws,” he said.

“I think it’s about time for politicians to live in the real world. To live under the same laws and pay the same taxes as the rest of us. If it works for Texas and Florida, it can work for California. Let’s let these guys work three months out of the year.”

Democrats have had control of the state legislature for the last 39 of 40 years, giving California the highest poverty rate, the highest unsheltered homeless rate, a failure to provide water storage for droughts and an inadequate education system, he said.

Allen is the only one of the three major Republican candidates for governor who publicly supported and voted for Donald Trump.


Even though California is heavily weighted toward Democrats, Allen said the numbers show that he can win. Gov. Jerry Brown was re-elected in 2014 with 4.3 million votes. In 2016, 4.4 million Californians voted for Trump.

“All we have to do is turn out the Trump voters and we take the governor’s seat in 2018,” he said. “If you win the governor’s seat, you win the state for a generation.”
